# Premise 1

- A worker interacts with their work environment holistically, as opposed to with their job tasks specifically
  - Physical space
  - Digital space
  - Human space
  - Policy, practice space
- Accessibility integrated throughout the work environment



# Premise 2

- A worker interacts with an organization over time, from the beginning of the job application process, through recruitment, hiring and onboarding, promotion, redeployment, career advancement/development, and performance management, right until job exit.
- Organizations are obligated to ensure accessibility throughout the time of a worker's engagement, not just at the very beginning.



# Axioms

- Lived experience with disability is not monolithic – everyone experiences (systemic) barriers in different (personal) ways
- The experiences of workers with disabilities who **come to work with their lived experience** are qualitatively different than those workers who **come into their lived experience at work**.
- Accessible and inclusive organizations need successfully implemented accessibility (and anti-ableism) policies and practices
- Successful implementation of an “inclusive and accessible employment system” (i.e., policy framework) **mitigates, but does not fully remove**, the need for accessibility supports in the workplace



# The Employment Standard as a Culture Change Tool

Today	Tomorrow
Medical Model	Social Model
Focus on disability	Focus on removing barriers
Emphasis on the person	Emphasis on the environment
Identification of barriers that individuals experience	Identification of systemic barriers
(Proactively) Responsive Approaches	Proactive Approaches
Duty to Accommodate	Accessible by Design workplaces, where Duty to Accommodate is one tool to “go beyond”

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# Changing Language, Changing Culture

- Disability → Barrier
- Accommodation → Accessibility Support (accommodation)
- Available on request → always available (or "available on demand")



# Tension

- Existing legislation and human rights codes – and existing provincial employment standards – are explicitly or implicitly built on the medical model of disability, the need for disability disclosure and documentation, and the duty to accommodate framework
- The *Accessible Canada Act* and its associated standards are predicated on the social model of disability
